I want to acknowledge and thank all the chemists who have volunteered their time, contributed to the advancement of science in the community and promoted the professional exchange for the past 120 years that allowed Cincinnati Local Section #202 to celebrate this "birthday". I believe a toast is due – Well Done! It is a privilege to serve this remarkable section as Chair for 2012-2013.

Our section also celebrates individual members who have received special recognition over the summer. The ACS Fellows for 2012 were announced in July, and Cincinnati is honored to have 4 of the inductees - Stacey Lowery Bretz, Joel Shulman, Subhas Sikdar, and Bill Oliver were all recognized at the National ACS meeting in Philadelphia for their significant contributions in their chemical fields and longstanding service to the ACS. Congratulations to you!! Locally, the Section recognized Bill Oliver with our "Outstanding Service" award at the May Party Night meeting. Read Bill's in depth record for the Fellows nomination and you will see why he was an obvious choice for this honor. We also formally recognized Matt Gardlik for the special effort he put forth last year implementing our electronic elections program. Offering online voting to our members provided +80% increase in voter participation!

We will Kick-Off our year with a weekend of activities Sept 22-23. The Section's Events will start with the opening of the "The George Rieveschl, Jr., History of Pharmaceutical Chemistry" exhibit. A celebratory reception is planned for Saturday, September 22 from 4-7pm, at the Lloyd Library & Museum downtown. The Trustees donated \$5,000 to support this permanent exhibit of the history of pharmacy, showcasing its ties to Cincinnati. From I-275 take the Colerain Avenue exit and go north on Colerain (US 27) for about 2.5 miles. Take the Kemper Road exit and turn right onto Kemper. Germania Park is on the right after about 1.3 miles. From I-275 W take exit #36 toward Mt. Healthy. Turn right onto Hamilton Avenue (US 127) and go north about 0.8 miles. Turn left onto West Kemper Road. Germania Park is on the left after 1.6 miles.

Outstanding Service Awards-2012

Professor William R. Oliver - Outstanding Service Award

The Outstanding Service Award was established in 1997 to formally recognize the dedicated service and outstanding contributions sustained over a period of time by individual members to the Cincinnati Section. This year the section recognized Professor William R. Oliver for consistently providing his time and talent to the betterment of the Cincinnati Section.

After completing his Ph.D. at Iowa State University, Bill Oliver began his professional career at Procter and Gamble, where he worked at their Miami Valley Laboratories for three years. He then joined the faculty of Northern Kentucky University where he taught for 35 years. For 16 of those years, he served as Chair of the Chemistry Department. Throughout his career, Bill maintained an active role in the Cincinnati section, serving in various capacities including Chair, 1st Vice-Chair, Treasurer, Trustee, Councilor, Alternate Councilor, Public Relations Chair and Educational Services Chair. Some of his most notable contributions have been made at the national level while serving as Councilor. The service of our councilors at the national level is perhaps not so visible to our members. Councilors play a vital role in our section by representing our concerns, influencing national ACS policy and helping keep the local section informed of upcoming changes and developments. As a councilor for the Cincinnati Section, Bill has done an outstanding job of representing the local section by serving on three national committees: Committee on Public Relations and Communications (CPRC), Committee on Science (ComSci), and the Meetings and Expositions Committee (M&E). Bill has been very engaged in the activities of these committees and has served as chair of the above three committees. His position as chair of M & E made him an ex officio member of the Council Policy Committee. Bill is continuing to serve the Cincinnati Section as a councilor and is currently a member of the National Historic Chemical Landmarks committee and an associate member of the Committee on Public Relations and Communications.

It is due to the longstanding commitment and efforts of Professor Bill Oliver - and others like him - that our section continues to provide an outstanding program to the great benefit of our members and local community. Congratulations, Bill, and thank-you for your many years of outstanding service!!

Matt Gardlik- Catalyst Award

Sometimes members of the Cincinnati Section make special contributions to our section and the Section would like a way to recognize this service. In the past from time to time, the Section has presented Special Recognition Awards. However, after discussion with the Chair, the Chair-elect and the Board last spring, it was decided to call the award to recognize special, exceptional contributions the Catalyst Award. The award would be given on an ad hoc basis rather than annually.

The first Catalyst awardee is Matt Gardlik, Ph.D. Ohio State University. Matt has been organizing, maintaining and updating our website for the past five years. In addition, he edits the content each month and responds to Web-Master inquiries. The website greatly facilitates the meeting registration process and has become an essential communication tool- especially with the increasing and now nearly constant access to the web via various digital tools. Clearly doing the above activities is not a small job and having done it so well for five years is worthy of recognition. However, in addition, Matt has created and played a key role in testing and implementing our new electronic elections program. Having a web based digital election system not only makes voting very easy for members, but also facilitates counting the ballots. The new electronic system worked flawlessly in the 2012 election. Having an active well-functioning website in place made the decision by the Board of the Cincinnati Section to move to electronic distribution of CINTACS, our monthly newsletter, a very easy call. Electronic distribution via our web site improves and speeds up communication with our members. Electronic balloting and distribution of CINTACS provides significant savings to the Section by eliminating printing and mailing costs. Matt Gardlik's activities and diligent efforts over the past five year have catalyzed positive changes in our section. Matt exemplifies the spirit embodied in the Catalyst Award and is clearly deserving of this recognition. Matt has recently completed his law degree at Capital University Law School in Columbus and has accepted a position at a law firm in Indianapolis. ODE · ABC POEM · FREE VERSE · END RHYME


Participants are encouraged to explore the nanoscience related to the environment, energy, materials and health. Possible topics include:

- · Colorful artwork

- · Adherence to poem style
- · Originality and creativity
- Overall presentation



Contest Rules:

- · Poems must conform to a particular style. No poem may be longer than 40 words.
- . The topic of the poem and the illustration must be related to the NCW 2012 theme, "Nanotechnology: The Smallest BIG Idea in Science".
- · All entries must be original works without aid from others.
- · Each poem must be submitted and illustrated on an unlined sheet of paper (of any type) not larger than 11" x 14". The illustration must be created by hand using crayons, watercolors, other types of paint,

colored pencils or markers. The text of the poem should be easy to read and may be printed with a computer, before the hand-drawn illustration is added, or the poem may be written on lined paper which is cut out and pasted onto the unlined paper with the illustration.

- · All entries must include an entry form.
- · All illustrated poems and/or digital representations of the poems become the property of the American Chemical Society.
- · Acceptance of prizes constitutes consent to use winners' names, likenesses and entries for editorial, advertising and publicity purposes.

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
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
