The featured speaker for the evening is Judson Haynes III, Ph.D. Dr. Haynes is the Past - President of the National Organization for the Professional Advancement of Black Chemists and Chemical Engineers (NOBCChE), a position he has held from July 2013 - June 2015. NOBCChE was founded in 1972 with the mission of "building an eminent cadre of people of color in science and technology". As President, Dr. Haynes was responsible for forwarding the mission of NOBCChE through programs, training and collaboration with industry, government and academia. Under Dr. Haynes' leadership, NOBCChE increased the number of unique programs designed to foster professional development, access to growth opportunities in STEM and gain full employment in the scientific enterprise.

Dr. Haynes earned a B.A. in Chemistry with Honors from Hampton University and a Ph.D. in Chemistry from Louisiana State University. Currently, Dr. Haynes is a Section Head in Family Care R&D at Procter & Gamble in Cincinnati, Ohio.

The Cincinnati Section mourns the loss of Dr. Joseph 'Doc' Caruso. Joe passed away Monday, November 23, 2015.

A chemistry professor at the University of Cincinnati since 1969, Joe had also served as Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. Joe was active in the Cincinnati Section and was awarded the section's Chemist of the Year award in 1992. In 2011 Joe was named an ACS Fellow for his outstanding achievements in his field and his contributions to the ACS.

AACT Event at Chemical Educators Discussion Meeting

On Nov 10th at Parker Blue Ash Restaurant, one of the main topics of the Chemical Educators Discussion quarterly meeting was to learn about AACT. What is AACT? It is a new organization for k-12 Chemistry/ Science teachers created by ACS. Cincinnati, along with 4 other sections that include Chicago, Indiana, Dayton, and St Joseph Valley local sections, applied and were awarded an Innovative Project Grant (IPG) to help promote AACT in our areas.



More specifically, AACT is a membership organization designed by teachers for teachers and created by the ACS. As a member of this organization, teachers have many benefits that include quick and easy access to classroom resources (curriculum, lesson plans, multimedia), a subscription to ACS magazine *ChemMatters*, professional development opportunities, and access to online periodicals at a fraction of the ACS national membership fee.



Linda Ford, leader of the Chemical Educators Discussion group, and Jackie Thomas, Chair-Elect 2015, coordinated the Nov 10th event. A total of 20-area science teachers turned out for the event! Teachers were very surprised to learn that the National ACS President, Dr Diane G. Schmidt, was able to join and spoke to the importance of AACT to ACS and to the education of science and chemistry students. Additionally, local Seven Hills teacher, Jennifer Torline, shared her personal experiences as a current member of AACT. She led the meeting attendees through a tour of the online website, demonstrated how easy it was to find content that supplemented her lesson plans, and talked through examples of activities she has used in her classroom.


